

Located in Cragmor Hall, Career Services is here to answer any career related questions you may have. Career Services offers students and alumni resume and cover letter reviews, career assessments, job search guidance, and a one-on-one career counseling.

Career Services partners with different colleges within UCCS to coordinate more outreach opportunities for students. They also provide career exploration for those students who are not quite sure of which degree program to pursue.

Throughout the year, Career Services connects students and alumni with local employers through various events across campus. Some of these events include; career fairs, employer visits, and etiquette dinners to name a few. They also help coach students on how to make the best first impression.

To help students look career ready, they host a JCPenney Suit-Up Event every semester where students, alumni, faculty and staff can receive up to 40% off their professional attire purchase. Students and alumni are also able to take advantage of Clyde's Closet within the Career Services Office. Clyde's Closet provides students/alumni up to 6 items for free, each semester.

APISU is a student club at UCCS that is open to all students regardless of race and ethnicity. The club focuses on breaking down stereotypes, learning about different cultures and making new friends. APISU President, Emily Nguyen, is serving her second year of her three-year leadership role. She explained that the three main objectives of the club revolve around social events, cultural learning, and service.

Every fall, APISU hosts the *Raging Asian Cultural Event (RACE)*. This event showcases different countries, and one member has compared it to an "Asian science fair." The club members are divided into different groups and research the different countries in order to talk about them at the event.

Every spring, they host the *FUSION* event (April 10, 2020). At this event, there are different modern and traditional performances that bring awareness to the obstacles of being Asian American. Last year this event won a *Mountain Lion Excellence Club Award* and a *ROAR Award* for Diversity Program of the year.

As mentioned, another huge component of this club is service. Both now and in the past, APISU has given back in more ways than one. Recently, they volunteered at the UCCS Cool Science Fair and the Day of Action Concert. As part of their mission, they serve as mentors to other multicultural clubs in how to navigate hosting events. RECIPES

Mixed Berry Yogurt Parfaits | Breakfast Prep for the Week

What you will need:

- 6 cups of your favorite yogurt
- 3 cups granola
- 3 cups of your favorite fresh fruits
- Small Ziploc bags
- 6 small plastic food storage containers with lids or mason jars

*The dollar store had little containers and bags

Let's prep:

- 1. Start with a ½ cup layer of yogurt in each container.
- 2. Place ¼ cup of fresh fruit on top of the yogurt layer.
- 3. Repeat with another layer of yogurt and fruit.
- 4. For this step, you can either put your granola on top or place ¼ cup in a bag (6 bags total).
 *I used bags to keep the granola crunchy
- 5. Place your lids on your containers and stack your parfaits in your fridge.
